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
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
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### **Preface**

This book could be titled several ways. One alternative is "Environmental Law in Context: Energy and Natural Resources Law." Such a title would emphasize that environmental law saturates the study of so-called "energy law" and that environmental law itself could be understood better by placing it in the context of a crucial industry, one which must meet both market demands and the need to maintain a sustainable world. The energy industry is a microcosm of all industries and almost all of the major environmental statutes may be introduced in this setting. Moreover, because of the impact of mining, damming water, or burning fuel, how energy is pursued fundamentally affects the quality of our environment.

The current book title—"Energy Policy: The REEL World"—emphasizes that the book surveys numerous fields. Traditional "energy law" deals with two main subject matters. First, it details the laws an energy producer must comply with in order to harness or produce an energy source, be it oil, natural gas, uranium, solar energy, or water power. This often requires knowledge of natural resources law. Second, an energy law text must examine governmental regulation of energy producers, which often took the form of economic regulation of utilities. The latter concern is the realm of regulated industries law. However, since the 1970s, "regulation" is sometimes synonymous with environmental regulation and the energy producer and marketer cannot ignore these dictates. Therefore, however titled, a journey through this material shows the interrelationship of several fields of law.

An explanation of the organization of the material is in order. First, the basic legal framework of the United States is examined to learn the nature of the players who shape energy law and policy. Next, over-riding constitutional issues such as federalism and the limits of regulatory authority are reviewed. The book then details traditional economic regulation. Next, the various energy fuel cycles are examined, beginning with oil and gas. Federal and state regulation of the gas industry is then scrutinized. Two additional regulatory arenas then follow: electric regulation and the particular laws governing hydro-electric development. By proceeding in this manner, the reader receives an early grounding in all the matters subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). After completing this overview of constitutional, administrative, and regulatory law, the text moves to a general introduction to environmental law. This discussion will continue through the material examining the fuel cycles of coal, uranium, and alternative energy sources. Finally, the book explores access to water, public lands, and Native American lands.




