Preface

Our purpose in this latest edition, as previously, is to produce a classroom case-book of manageable length that stresses the interplay of constitutional principles and the practical considerations that confront both prosecutors and defense attorneys. Lengthy Supreme Court decisions have been substantially edited, although hopefully the "flavor" of the constitutional views of the various Justices has been retained. The insertion of sample forms is intended to illustrate the manner in which Supreme Court edict has filtered down to work-a-day law enforcement and prosecutors. Problems, for the most part extracted from lower court decisions, serve to demonstrate the vague parameters of Supreme Court pronouncements.

To produce a highly teachable book, the major sacrifice has been scope of coverage. Our emphasis has been upon three major subject areas: Search and Seizure; Right to Counsel; and Confessions.
